
### A KIWANIS REFLECTION

When you perform at the Kiwanis Music Festival, to be truthful, it's somewhat nerve wracking, regardless if you're singing or playing an instrument. But when you're up there with 12 or 13 other people that are excited to start playing and show off their accomplishments to the adjudicator, then you know you're not alone and you can play with a sense of pride and belonging. I think the hardest part of playing handbells in front of an audience is getting your part really down pact, because you know your group is counting on you to get it right.





After decades of non-participation (other than watching my kids' performances), I am finally re-entering the world of music festivals. In an effort to drive up our performance experience and to improve our skills, my handbell director entered Quarter Notes (a Calgary based quartet) into the Calgary Kiwanis Music Festival. After our group's initial trepidation of competing against top notch school choirs, and with the Kiwanis administration fumbling around trying to figure out what to do with an adult, community-based choir, we settled into our rehearsal routines focusing on technique, dynamics and the general musicality of our performance.

All of this reminded me of the whole purpose of music festivals – to provide participants to demonstrate their skills and talents in a supportive environment. The competitive aspect supplies the amateur musicians an incentive to develop and grow their artistic skills – to strive for the best. Music festivals also provide an avenue for the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringer to achieve its mission of cultivating and fostering the art of handbell ringing throughout Alberta. It is for this reason that the Board of Directors approved the expansion of our scholarship programs from the Edmonton Kiwanis Music Festival to festivals in Calgary, Fort McMurray and Lethbridge this year. The inclusion of handbells in the festivals has encouraged schools to solicit support from our membership to provide workshops as students and teachers drive to get ready for their performance. This, in turn, promotes the formation of new choirs and extends music education in handbells throughout our school systems. These are all ALGEHR's goals as well.

I am personally very proud of our membership in the role they play in growing the art of handbell ringing throughout our province and that we can visibly show our support through scholarships. As more handbell communities develop, we will proudly support festivals within those areas as well.

As for Quarter Notes, we survived the experience, became a better ensemble and hopefully will be able to show our improvements through future performances. This is the true power of the music festival.

Since our last PEAL, Leonard Davidchuk, our former editor has moved on to oversee the development of our web-based classified ad tool. Together with Cliff Linton and Lori Teneycke, we are looking forward to its kick-off within the next couple of months. Leonard has grown the PEAL since he initially signed on as editor in 2007 with his upbeat style and graphics. Our new editor, Anne Hergott, who was introduced to you in our last Peal, brings her own unique editorial direction plus a lot of energy – I am really looking forward to our upcoming issues!





Winners of the composer competition could have their works performed at the Lethbridge Handbell Discovery "Ring Beside the Bridge" on October 15-16, 2010.



Classic Bronze, an advanced massed ringing event, will be held in Edmonton, from Thursday afternoon, July 1 through Sunday afternoon, July 4, 2010. Classic Bronze will feature advanced level 3/4/5 music and is seeking ringers capable of reading level 3 and performing level 5 music.

Interested ringers will need to send the application form, the reference form attesting to the ringer's skill and musicianship, as well as a registration fee. Application materials are available on the <a href="www.classicbronze.org">www.classicbronze.org</a> website. For details, contact Cathy Koski at <a href="rkoski@telusplanet.net">rkoski@telusplanet.net</a>. Repertoire will be available for purchase March, 2010 by participants. Classic Bronze will have four core handbell sets - two six-octave sets and two five-octave sets along with various complementary instruments.

We are excited that this event will be conducted by **Kevin McChesney** of Colorado Springs. Kevin McChesney is a true handbell professional. He has composed more than 400 arrangements and original works for handbells and is in constant demand as conductor and clinician world-wide.

Rehearsals will be held at *Concordia University College, in Edmonton* (<a href="www.concordia.ab.ca">www.concordia.ab.ca</a>). The culminating concert will be on Sunday afternoon, **July 4** at the Tegler Center at the University and will be open to the public.
