



HANDBELL CHOIR ON THE MOVE

Tinnitus (the Grace Presbyterian Church bell choir under the direction of Lori Teneycke) knows all about spreading the joy of ringing bells. This year, Tinnitus traveled to venues outside their church to share their repertoire with other congregations. Anyone who has lifted a full bell case knows that it's not an easy task to haul bells around, or re-organize a choir in a new church or performance venue. It's always worth the effort however, when you see firsthand how much joy is shared.

Director Lori Teneycke plans these Out Reach trips every year for her choir. In this season Tinnitus ventured out to Carstairs on a beautiful autumn morning to be part of morning worship at Bethel Evangelical Church. They followed that with an afternoon performance at Chinook Winds Lodge. In the early spring some of the choir members also traveled to Arizona. In May, they played two worship services at St. Andrew's Presbyterian, Calgary. Music was the message that morning as they played a number of pieces on their own, and then joined the Chancel Choir with "God of Grace God of Glory" and "Just a Closer Walk with Thee" (with guest Clarinetist, Andrew Morrow).

Plans for the new season once again include Out Reach at other local churches and venues. It's a fantastic experience for the ringers, and all who have the privilege to hear them.



Spring Youth Festivals

Fort McMurray Handbell Festival

There were over 14 youth handbell choirs who participated in the local Oilsands Rotary Music Festival on April 4th and 5th. There were four schools that took part in this event. For the first time in Fort McMurray history, an adult handbell choir (Good Vibrations), participated in the Music Festival as well. The adjudicator, Beth Cook, did a great job giving feedback to each choir and giving each choir advice on how each choir can strive to be better ringers. The Intermediate Handbell Choir from St. Anne's school was chosen to perform at the Grand Concert on May 5th.

The Oilsands Rotary Music Festival Awards night was May 7th and the ALGEHR award for the Best Beginner Handbell Performance went to the St. Anne's 5C Handbell choir.

The president of the Fort McMurray Oilsands Rotary Music Festival said that there were seven awards given out to handbell choirs. This is a huge offering of support to our Fort McMurray community of handbells.

Calgary Youth Handbell Festivals

This year two half-day festivals were held in Calgary. Seven choirs representing 85 ringers participated by performing their own selection for adjudication, followed by mini-clinic and also participated in a massed ringing of "Grand Entry" by Kathleen Wissinger. Both festivals concluded with a miniconcert featuring solo performances by each choir and the massed piece in front of an enthusiastic audience of students and parents from the host schools. Participation certificates were provided for by the two school boards, snacks were sponsored by **ALGEHR** and the adjudicator/clinician/massed conductor was Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin.

Classic Bronze 2012 Presents Handbell Extravaganza: From Jazz to Opera

Let all your friends know about this great concert!

Edmonton, AB - "The bells! The bells!" Quasimodo cried, shaking his head in agony from the sound. When you think of bells, Victor Hugo's fictitious character from "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" often comes to mind. From the huge tower bells to smaller hand-held bells providing melodic entertainment, the art of English handbell ringing began over 300 years ago and continues to this day worldwide. To that end, advanced handbell ringers from across the country are excited about coming to Edmonton July 5-8 to participate in **Classic Bronze 2012**; Canada's only advanced handbell festival, where they will play a wonderful mix of jazz, opera, and spiritual repertoire. Dig that, Quasimodo!


Classic Bronze 2012 extends a warm invitation to the Edmonton community to attend the **Handbell Extravaganza**: From Jazz to Opera closing concert Sunday, July 8, at 4:00 pm in the Concordia University College Robert Tegler Student Centre where they will perform a new take on old favourites—everything from Dave Brubeck's "Blue Rondo a la Turk" to "Overture from The Marriage of Figaro" by Mozart. Tickets are just \$12 adults, \$10 students & seniors, and \$25 per family. Due to limited seating, tickets are available in advance

Edmonton's own Dr. John Hooper, handbell music composer, founder of the popular handbell ensemble JUBILOSO!, and Professor of Music at Concordia University College, will direct the massed choir through three days of rehearsal as well as the Handbell Extravaganza: From Jazz to Opera closing performance. Known for both handbell and choral skills, the multi-talented Hooper is constantly in demand as conductor and clinician worldwide, having recently returned from Australia and Croatia. He has previously served as Canadian conductor at International Handbell Symposia in Australia and Japan and his "Toccata" composition will be featured at the 2012 International Handbell Symposium in Liverpool summer.

This is the fourth Classic Bronze event which began in 2007. Classic Bronze 2012 thanks Concordia University College, Handbells etc. and the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringers for their support.

New Born Again

Arr. McChesney, 3456 octave, Level 1

This spiritual will work for both schools and churches. It starts with mallet accompaniment - to make this part even, each ringer below F5 will need two mallets. This makes a great piece for a festival competition because it is filled with so much music, dynamics and techniques. Your adjudicators will smile when they hear this!

'Tis the Old Ship of Zion with Michael

Arr. Robert, 23 octaves, Level 1

The publisher calls these tunes "traditional folk melodies"- they seem more like spirituals or old time gospel to me. Regardless of how these are classified, it seems to me that this is great arrangement! It starts out lively with plucking in the bass and melody in the treble. The melody moves to the middle bells, then Michael Rows the Boat Ashore comes in. Dennis Robert has done a terrific job winding these two melodies together.

Bellrhomba

Davenport, 3 octaves with percussion, Level 2

This original piece can be called Celebration or Bellabration if you like! You really need to add the percussion to it - it helps keep the rhythm! The composer suggests the use of bongos and claves. The bass part is repetitive so that in some portions, you might be able to add some Orff instruments to the music! Keep the pace of the pieces, add the accents, incorporate the percussion and your ringers and audiences will love it!

Give Thanks

Arr. McChesney, 345 octaves, Level 2

This is one of my favourite contemporary Christian pieces. The melody is simple but the message is strong.

You could add a voice speaking the lyrics during the introduction of 12 bars. You might add some chimes on the melody at measure 13 so that it comes out strongly over the bells. This is a great arrangement and sounds more like a level 3 than a level 2!

Sonrise (Sunrise)

Turner, 345 octaves, Level 2

This original composition will work well with for either school or church settings. It starts out with mallets on suspended bells LV. The simple, but slow eighth note pattern enters and one can begin to imagine the sun rising.

Celebration

Gramman, 345 octaves, Level 2+

This is a great piece that works anywhere - truly a Celebration! Resounding Joy has played this in worship several times this year. When it is played at the speed suggested (165 -185 for the quarter note), it only takes about 90 seconds to play! We added Choirchimes to the bass melody in the middle section, but otherwise played it exactly as written.

Handbell Music Reviews continued:

Fairest Lord Jesus

Arr. Larson, 345 octaves, Level 3

This is in total contract to Gramman's Celebration. This meditative arrangement of the Crusader's hymn seems more like a level 2 piece but when you add the dynamics and musicality, it moves to at least a level 3 piece. This gives your choir the opportunity to focus on dynamics, phrasing and perhaps stretching some of the measures. If it is the time of year that you want to move your choir ahead with their musicality, this is the piece to use!

Joyful, Joyful

McChesney, 345 octaves with keyboard, Level 3 I haven't seen an arrangement of this piece for a while. I think I like this one! The piece starts out stately and grand, then after the first verse, becomes suddenly fast - metronome marking is 144 for the quarter note! The timing moves to a syncopated rhythm into a section that features just the handbells. The keyboard gets a solo turn for a while, and then they both play it out to the end! Because of the speed of the piece, you will need an accomplished pianist.

Forever

Arr. Wagner, 345 octaves, Level 3

This is the perfect piece to incorporate handbells into a contemporary worship setting. This Chris Tomlin piece is a stand-alone arrangement but also has an optional brass, tenor sax and rhythm parts. I would suggest that you have your choir listen to the recording of this piece so they can get the feel for the syncopation in the music. I bet your ringers will like it!

Steal Away

Arr. Mets, 345 octaves, Level 3

This spiritual starts out very simply with the melody in octaves - all LV. To make this the best that it can be, all circles need to be the same and the "click" of the clapper needs to be at exactly the same time. The notes are not hard but to ensure that you have the correct feel to this piece, you need to start out precisely to set the mood that you want to set. Once the mood is set, the piece practically plays by itself.

Colorado Suite Movement 3: Mountain Streams

McChesney, 345 octaves, Level 3

This is one of a series of 4 original compositions by Kevin McChesney. This movement is flowing and lyrical. It would work well for both community and church settings. It might work well to have a PowerPoint presentation during the performing of it with scenes of the Rocky Mountains and their streams.

Handbell Music Reviews continued:

Precious Lord, Take My Hand

Arr. Lamb, 345 octaves Opt Choirchimes, Level 3
This is a wonderful arrangement of this piece - I like it so much that I plan to purchase it for the handbell choir that I direct at church. I love how she has the first verse with Choirchimes for the melody and echoes in the accompaniment. The music is tender and beautiful. The last verse adds the swing to the eighth notes that we are used to hearing with this piece.

Give Me Jesus

Arr. Behnke, 345 octaves, Level 4

Give Me Jesus is a traditional spiritual that will work anytime of the Christian year. This starts with a singing bell, and then moves to what John want us to ring "thoughtfully". The singing bell continues and then there is a section where there is solo ringing - this ringer will be able to play this section "freely" - the only accompaniment is a singing bell. Chimes are added, keys are changed and the music continues to flow on. The piece is written in 4/2 timing - which may pose a challenge to your ringers - well worth it though!

Our musical journey will convene in Tel Aviv along the Mediterranean Sea for our first concert. This will be followed by concerts in Jerusalem and the area of Nazareth/Galilee. You will get to know Inbalim Ensemble, a member of Peimon, Israel Association of Handbell Ringers. Since their organization in 2009, it has become their passion to establish choirs in Israel churches, senior citizens' homes, among special needs populations, and in low-income districts for troubled youth. The balance of our concert program will be inclusive of Inbalim Ensemble and individual selections of participating choir groups and/or ensembles. What a wonderful place this will be for you to showcase your talents as handbell musicians to the people of Israel!

This will be a life changing experience. I would love for you and your ringers to be a part of this tour. And yes, individuals and partial groups will also be accommodated, as well as non-ringing tour members.

I hope you will seriously consider being part of this international festival to the Holy Land. With you, this would be a wonderful partnership.
