These are just three of the many experiences 11 ringers from Alberta shared during the first international handbell festival in Israel. Conceived by Debbie Rice (currently with Concordia) and Brenda Alony of Israel, this project took several years to come to fruition.

After a gentle first day in Tel Aviv to help us get over jetlag, we dove into 8 days of intense sightseeing, including well known places like the Grotto of the Nativity, the Garden of Gethsemane and the Western Wall. We also visited Bet Shean, the largest archaeological site in Israel, Masada and the Golan Heights, to mention only a few.

Oh yes, we did play handbells as well! Fifteen ringers from the USA, 3 from Hong Kong and 1 from Puerto Rico joined the 11 Albertan ringers, under the direction of Debbie Rice. In Tel Aviv and Jerusalem we were joined by the Inbalim Ensemble, an excellent Israeli handbell choir and by a youth hand chime choir, Ramat Hasharon Conservatory Handchimes Choir.

After our opening concert in Tel Aviv, we played in the Jerusalem International YMCA, followed by a delicious dinner. In Haifa, we played in St. Gregorious Church, literally a stone's throw from the Mediterranean Sea. Our final concert was in Nazareth at Jesus the Adolescent Church where we had to split our tables, some high near the altar, some on the floor. All concerts were well attended; we were received with interest, enthusiasm and much appreciation. One elderly lady in Haifa was seen blowing kisses to us after the last number!

Our 8 non-ringers had a great time too. Join us next time - is it New Zealand or Estonia / Finland??

#### Edmonton 2013 Youth Festivals

Three youth festivals were organized in Edmonton this spring, with 16 choirs participating. Also participating was the Northgate Seniors Bell Choir as a guest at one of the festivals. Susan Galloway was an excellent adjudicator, offering encouragement and challenges to each choir. The massed ringing piece was "My Heart Ever Faithful," by Bach, arranged by Sharon Elery Rogers.

All these festivals were highly successful. There was a lot of great feedback about the choice of music for the festivals, and many other positive comments were shared.

Special thanks go out to Wendy Hoskin and any others from the organizing team that helped to put together these fantastic festivals!

#### **New York Ringing**

One of our many talented handbell experts from Alberta has been busy in another country. This past spring, Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin (HGC Chair), was invited to be a guest conductor at the 35<sup>th</sup> Annual English Handbell Festival at the Riverside Church in New York. Riverside Church was quite an experience to perform in, as it is the tallest church in the USA and 24th tallest in the world!

Emmy said afterwards that it was "an absolutely breathtaking space to perform in and such an incredible honour to be invited." Emmy conducted most of the 9 pieces memorized, and had a very busy couple of days.

#### WORSHIP SERVICE ON MAY 12, 2013 INVOLVING THE WESTWORTH UNITED CHURCH CHAPEL BELLS Winnipeg, Manitoba

At the conclusion of the Mother's Day service on May 12, 2013, Westworth United Church totally surprised and overwhelmed Chapel Bells Director, Morna-June Morrow, by giving the premiere performance of *"Rejoice in the Dance"*, an original handbell and handchime composition with oboe or clarinet commissioned from American composer Timothy H. Waugh of Charlotte, North Carolina. The dedication read:

Dedicated to Morna-June Morrow with heartfelt thanks and gratitude for 25 years of devoted and inspired leadership of Westworth United Church Chapel Bells.

The current members plus former members and directors of four other church handbell choirs plus two oboists participated in the performance, conducted by the current Westworth Director of Music, Stuart Sladden.

After the service, a reception honouring Morna-June's *tremendous gift to the life of Westworth United Church* was held during which time more presentations were made, including the following speech by Jewel Casselman.

# SPEECH GIVEN BY JEWEL CASSELMAN AT THE RETIREMENT RECEPTION OF MORNA-JUNE MORROW ON SUNDAY, MAY 12, 2013 AT WESTWORTH UNITED CHURCH, WINNIPEG, MANITOBA

It all started with a newspaper article in the *Winnipeg Tribune* in the fall of 1968 about two bells choirs in Winnipeg. Tec Voc High School had a set of English handbells purchased in 1966 and West Kildonan's Little Carilloneurs had a set of Swiss bells and resonator bells that were struck with a mallet. Morna-June's principal at Oakenwald School asked her if she knew anything about these English bells. M-J had heard the Tec Voc High School bell ringers play earlier in the year at the Winnipeg Music Festival and she was intrigued by their sound. Her principal asked if she would be interested in teaching the bells to her elementary students, if the Fort Garry School Division purchased a set of these bells. Never backing down from a good challenge and trying something new and exciting, Morna-June said that she would love the opportunity to take on this new adventure.

So, in March of 1969, a two octave set of 25 Schulmerich handbells arrived in Winnipeg from Pennsylvania, packed in individual cardboard boxes like wine bottles, because the school division couldn't afford the cases. She phoned Fred Merrett at Tec Voc High School who already had a set of Schulmerich handbells and went over for a 40 minute crash course in the art of handbell ringing. The rest, as they say, is history.

The next year, Fort Garry purchased the third octave of bells plus the carrying cases for all three octaves. M-J used the handbells with various handbell groups at Oakenwald, Crane, and Chancellor Elementary Schools, plus the Junior High Fort Garry Carillons (who by the way, played right here at Westworth on December 21, 1980) and the Fort Garry Harmony Bells. These bells are still used in the Pembina Trail School Division at Dalhousie School.

Always an active learner and educator, Morna-June attended conferences in Kentucky, North Dakota, and Minnesota over the years. By September of 1973, she was totally hooked on handbells and so purchased the first four octave set of 49 bells in Manitoba. Years later in 2004, she added the five octave set of 61 Schulmerich Melody Chimes.

In the fall of 1988, Fort Garry School Division transferred M-J to Bonnycastle School. Westworth United Church Director of Music, Ruth Wiwchar, said to her, "That school doesn't know you have these handbells. Have you ever thought of using them in a church setting?" Well, you know how persuasive Ruth can be!!! So a motion was made by the Westworth Board that Morna-June would direct a handbell group at Westworth using her own equipment for one year. As you well know that "loan" has lasted for a quarter of a century. In 1998, she went to the expense of having the bells totally refurbished to include the Quick-Adjust clapper system.

In 2003 M-J was awarded the inaugural Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers Trophy at the Winnipeg Music Festival as the most outstanding handbell soloist. This same award was won by the Westworth Chapel Bells in 2007 as the most outstanding handbell choir.

Besides school and church groups, she has directed the University Women's Club Handbell Choir, the Manitoba Handbell Guild Christmas Choir, and the A'Pealing Bells. She formed the All Chim'in Handbell Quartet in 2009 and has played as a handbell soloist since 1998 for the Royal Canadian College of Organists, Winnipeg Girls Choir, Women of Note Choir, St. Benedict's Monastery, Fort Garry Hotel, Pantages Playhouse Theatre, Winnipeg Art Gallery, and at several churches and schools.

M-J is considered one of Canada's leading pioneers in the art of handbell ringing, having given handbell workshops all across Canada and in Minnesota. She has written extensive articles for various music publications provincially, nationally, and internationally. M-J has conducted massed ringing groups across Canada and in 2000, as the National Chair of the Handbell Guilds of Canada, she directed 800 handbell ringers from four continents at an International Handbell Symposium in Birmingham, England. This past Tuesday Morna-June received this e-mail message from Sandy Mullaney, the Chair of Area 7 (the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin) of the Handbell Musicians of America.

We want you to know how very important you have been to our area. You've generously shared your friendship, leadership, and handbell expertise with countless members of our Area through the years. We cannot thank you enough for going above and beyond to teach, share, answer our questions, serve as a role model and be a wonderful guiding light to our handbell community. We hope that on Sunday you will also share the following with your choir and all of your friends at Westworth.

At its meeting on Saturday, May 4, 2013 the Board of Area 7 Handbell Musicians of America unanimously voted to award Mona-June Morrow the title of Area 7 Honourary Life Member. As our first-ever Life Member, we wish to honour and thank you for all you've given to Area 7. Over the years there have been 87 musicians who have participated in the Chapel Bells. There have been 109 people who have assisted as substitute ringers. On occasion, former members have assumed the conducting role while M-J was recovering from several surgeries over the past decade, including our very own Stuart Sladden. The Chapel Bells have performed at many other events outside of regular worship services, including other churches and Temple Shalom, nursing homes, funeral homes, fund raisers and all 14 annual Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers Spring Rings.

Unfortunately loading and unloading her van of the 500 pounds of equipment for performances outside Westworth has taken its toll on Morna-June's health, especially so in the last decade. She came to realize that it is time to retire from a fascinating 44 years of directing handbell choirs.

On behalf of the congregation of Westworth United Church, and all of the bell ringers who have played with you here over the years, many thanks for enriching our church services here at Westworth through your unique way of ringing praises to God with the Chapel Bells.

Happy retirement, Morna-June!!!

## 2014 Jeju International Handbell Symposium Canadian Massed Ringing Conductor Selected

Handbell Guilds of Canada is pleased to announce that Tammy-Jo Mortensen of Edmonton, Alberta, has been selected to represent Canada at the *16th International Handbell Symposium* to be held in Jeju, Korea, August 5-9, 2014, as its massed ringing conductor. A graduate of the Music Faculties of McGill University and the University of Alberta, Tammy-Jo has been the Music Director at Robertson-Wesley United Church since 2003.

This is a bi-ennial global event that saw its origins in the USA in 1982 and has rotated between the six founding countries of the International Handbell Committee (Japan, Great Britain, Korea, Canada and Australia) ever since.

These international gatherings are an exciting opportunity for handbell musicians from around the world to come together to learn from each other through a wide variety of technical and cultural workshops, start and renew global friendships, take in some local sight-seeing, but most importantly, participate in intensive massed rehearsals in preparation for a public massed ringing concert. Each founding country appoints one massed conductor to direct all ringers in the rehearsal of their nation's selected composition. It is indeed a fine honour and privilege to be chosen for this important role.

Handbell Guilds of Canada sponsors a symposium composition contest in the hopes of encouraging more Canadian composers to write for this unique genre. The latest winning submission to be performed by all the ringers in Jeju is entitled "Snow Dream", an original handbell composition by Winnagene Hatch of London, Ontario. A graduate of the University of Toronto and the Royal Conservatory of Music, Winnagene is Director of Music at Lambeth United Church and published composer of choral music for church and school.

Attendance at international symposia has grown since its humble beginnings and averages between 500-800 delegates although there were 1100 ringers in Osaka in 2010! Edmonton was the first Canadian city to host in 1992 followed by Toronto in 2004. The next Canadian host city will be Vancouver in 2016. All Canadian musicians are invited and strongly urged to get involved, either as a ringer, conductor or by creating a handbell arrangement or original work for the national composition contest.
