Who is Fred Merrett? You ask?

There are very few people who have had a greater effect on the Canadian Handbell Fraternity than Fred Merrett, and indeed he is the only Canadian to be named a Life Member by all the Canadian Handbell Guilds! **Of course, what stands out to all ringers in North America is the number of handbell compositions and arrangements** penned by Fred Merrett.

Fred Merrett's accomplishments in the handbell world are too numerous to list really. However, several highlights can be mentioned, including:

- thirty-eight years teaching handbells in the schools and educating teachers
- twenty-five years from 1980 to 2005 in which he instigated and became Coordinator of the week of Handbells at the International Music camp
- conducting the 4.5 octave Bronze Harmony Handbell Choir for the twenty-one years directly after his retirement from the school board
- adjudicating many handbell festivals and giving countless workshops
- being the Massed Ringing Conductor at the International Handbell Festival in Vancouver during Expo 86, and two of the International Symposia - Korea in 1990 and Edmonton in 1992
- serving as President of the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringers from 1988 to 1990.

Edmonton Youth Festivals 2014 Report



Debbie Rice was our adjudicator and did a wonderful job of encouraging and work shopping with each choir. Our massed ring piece was 'Campano Sonos' by Kathleen Wissinger. This piece uses lots of different techniques and everyone seemed to like the choice. Debbie was able to adapt the techniques for chimes. I was very impressed with all the students' performances – from beginner to experienced. The choirs were attentive, responsive and well behaved and seemed to really appreciate the whole experience.

This is the way we chose to describe our spring concert at First Baptist Church in Calgary on June 1st. The "Pipes" were the 100 year old **Casevant** pipe organ played by **Dr. Bruce Clark**, church organist. The "Peals" were Acclamation, the senior handbell choir at First Baptist.

Dr. Clark played several Bach preludes and fugues as well as other wonderful organ songs. He even invited the children to come to the platform to see the organ "up close and personal" and to assist him in one of his songs.

We rang our favorite pieces from the year's work, from *Dance Jubilee* to *Capriccio* to a grand finale of *Majesty*, which included piano and organ. If you have never heard additional instruments enhancing the sound of the handbells, you have really missed out! You wouldn't think that a mandolin, a guitar, a tambourine, and a couple of drums would mesh very well with a few octaves of handbells, but the pieces came out in spectacular fashion and the crowd loved them!

JUBILOSO! BELLS OF Concordia, Concordia Choir and David Yates (Didgeridoo)

After close to fifty years of attending handbell concerts all over the world, one would think it would be difficult to come up with something unique and new. **Jubiloso! Bells of Concordia** and their director, **Debbie Rice**, proved that wrong at their concert on March 29 at the Tegler Building of Concordia College. **Didgeridoo player David Yates** of British Columbia, was the featured artist, and played a number of different didgeridoos with skill, musical finesse and humour on several pieces written for handbells and didgeridoo. I found it interesting that both pieces written just for those two instruments were by a North American composer. I thoroughly enjoyed the compositions and would love to hear them again, but for me they sounded contemporary and did not convey the feeling of Australia as I thought they would! Instead, I thought of 21st Century interest. This is not meant as criticism, it is just an observation.

The performance of "Night" by Graeme Morton, composed at the behest of Carmel Daveson for use at the 2006 International Handbell Symposium, *did* channel Australia for me. **The Concordia Choir**, about to leave for a tour of South America with their director, Joy Berg, joined Debbie, David and Jubiloso on the choral parts of the piece, producing clear tone, a strong musical line and delivering the haunting melody as if it was written for them, while their director added the rhythms on Aboriginal sticks. It was a fine rendition of a piece, originally written for a handbell event, that is now so highly regarded by Australia that it is about to be included in the next printing of the Australian music textbook for students.

Other highlights for me were the two pieces sung by the choir, both of which were beautifully and confidently sung. We are lucky to have student choirs of that calibre in Alberta, and I am sure they impressed their South American audiences.

Les Miserables Medley on bells has always been a personal favourite of mine, and I enjoyed this performance although my tendency to visualize everything was a bit distracting in the final "March of the Angry Men" as in my mind I watched several Valjeans running up the aisle at breakneck speed with the tempo at which it was played.

Another favourite was yet another composition by one of the Jubiloso ringers, **Betty Radford**. Betty began composing for handbells in the last few years of retirement from teaching music in Edmonton Public, and she has become quite a prolific and proficient composer for this idiom.

Betty Radford's pieces demonstrate knowledge of and sensitivity to handbells with their special characteristics, abilities and requirements as a musical instrument. Four of Betty's pieces have won composition competitions in the last two years. This recognition is certainly justified because all her compositions, including this arrangement of Jupiter from The Planets, stand out for the masterful way in which she chooses the bells for each section, effectively uses all bells in all octaves, skillfully applies the techniques for articulation that have been invented through the years to vary the sound and mood of the bells, and creates genuinely lovely pieces that appeal both to the ringer and the audience. Perhaps I am becoming too sentimental as time and my age advance, but I often have to work to keep my emotions in check when I hear fine new pieces by Canadians, as I have always wanted to see more Canadian compositions for handbells. The quality of Betty Radford's work gives great hope for the future.



Jubiloso tried a number of new ventures this year and is playing off-campus more often. I would strongly suggest keeping your eyes and ears "peeled" next year so that you don't miss any of their new ventures.

It will be hard to replicate those particular pieces, because skilled didgeridoo players are not plentiful in Canada, but who knows what they will offer us next? I look forward to finding out!





Soundings

Spring 2014 Update

Time marches on, and we are now just over two years away from **SOUNDINGS—Music of Our Lives** and **Our Land**. The Vancouver Convention Centre will be the site for the 17th International Handbell Symposium, welcoming as many as 1000 ringers from around the world! What a thrill it will be for **BCGEHR** to host this event on behalf of Handbell Guilds of Canada!

You've heard many times, in many places, that there will be many opportunities for you to be involved. First and foremost, we want to encourage all Canadian ringers to plan to attend! We are setting our goal for the Canadian contingent at 200 registrants! If you've always thought attending an international symposium was out of the question, for any reason, we'd like to reassure you on the following common objections:



An international symposium is much too expensive for me to consider attending.

There's no doubt it requires a much larger financial commitment to attend an international symposium than it does to attend a national or provincial festival. But Canada has not hosted one since 2004, and it could easily be 2030 or beyond before we do again. Attending the Symposium while it is in "our own backyard" makes the most sense! Secondly, did you realize that if you start now and put a mere \$40 a month aside, you will have saved enough to cover your registration fee? That's less than "A Latté a Day!" Build your plans to attend the symposium into your family's vacation plans for 2016 to lessen the impact of the hotel stay and make the most of a visit to one of the world's most beautiful cities.





The music will be far too difficult for me.

Most of the repertoire will be in Level 3 to 4 range, and unlike a national or provincial festival, you won't have the choice of Bronze, Copper or Tin levels in which to register. However, the music will be available for purchase almost a year in advance of the event, so you will have lots of time to study and learn it. And even if you feel some or all of the selections will be beyond your capability, you can still find ways to play. Some Canadian ringers who attended the 2012 Symposium in Liverpool were relatively new ringers. Strategies such as playing only the even



beats, or the first beat of each bar, or just not playing sections that are clearly too difficult to manage, will allow you to participate in the mass ringing to the level at which you are comfortable. You will likely be surprised at how much you are able to accomplish! The key, however, is to be honest and realistic about your abilities, know what you can manage and know when it is time for you to modify your playing. You won't be

alone!

Start planning now to attend. Get your choir or group to join together with some fundraising ideas. It will be an event you don't want to miss!



Composition Contest

Deadline for submission has been extended!

The deadline for submission of scores to **HGC**'s competition to choose Canada's selection for the 2016 International Handbell Symposium in Vancouver has been extended to **SEPTEMBER 1, 2014**! Please take advantage of this extension to make sure any composer or arranger you know is informed.

The Symposium's theme of "Soundings: Music of Our Lands and Our Lives" especially as it relates to the exploration of our history and first nations heritage, and a focus on environmentalism and sustainability, gives a great deal of scope for composition.

Honouring the ancestors of this land, including the aboriginal ways of knowing and being within an environment, has encouraged us to explore the many complementary ways that First Peoples' cultures and environmental sustainability intertwine and connect within community. We hope that the sounds of our lands and the lives of our peoples will be shared through the massed ringing compositions chosen for IHS 2016. **The information package can be downloaded from www.bcgehr.com**



The Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers invites you to attend the 7th National Ringing Link Conference of the **Handbell Guilds of Canada** at the **Victoria Inn, Winnipeg, Manitoba, from July 2-5, 2014.** The Manitoba Guild is basing the event on Charles Dickens' memorable and well-loved novel, "A Christmas Carol". Instead of being visited by the Spirits of Christmas Past, Present and Yet to Come, we will explore Christmas music of the Past (pre-19th century), the Present (19th century Victorian era of Dickens' time), and Music Yet to Come (20th/21st centuries). The massed ringing directors: Anne Hill (Victoria), Stuart Sladden (Winnipeg), Monica McGowan (Lakeville, Minnesota) and Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin (Calgary) have chosen delightful music ranging from the 16th to 21st centuries.

Individual workshops will be given by the massed directors as well as J.-C. Coolen, Susan Galloway, heather keith, Jan Nordstrand, Camille Ream and Susan Stevenson covering such topics as: Ensemble Ringing, Bell Trees, Music in Motion, Matching Sounds Across the Choir, Rhythmic Ensemble, Personal Practice Tips and Strategies, Change Ringing, Hands on Hand Chimes, What They See is What They Hear, Beginning and Advanced Conducting, Handbells with Orff instruments; Handbells with Church Choral Music, Read and Ring sessions with mixed repertoire (Christmas, non-Christmas, Sacred, Secular), warm up sessions as well as maintenance sessions on Malmark and Schulmerich handbells and chimes.

Mini-concerts will include solo, ensemble and full handbell choir performances and the Victorian Christmas Banquet will feature wonderful surprises musically, visually and appetizingly! Registration includes:
