And our bees, (a new enterprise, not without a few stings) – touch and go whether they will survive the Alberta winter despite warm wrapping in a Bee Cosy. We keep finding dead bees in the snow around the hive which may not bode well. We also have a Northern flicker pecking at the Bee Cosy trying get a delicious free insects meal from inside the hive.

But there's always inside gardening and I have been playing around with some hydroponics. And note, if you look up hydroponics on the Internet, you will inevitably come up with websites on how to grow industrial quantities of cannabis which is not my intention. It's still a challenging time for bell choirs and with gathering restrictions still in place, Christmas services are going to be somewhat different this year. COVID Capsules

So, normally at this time of year, most of our ensembles would be proudly proclaiming that they are ready for "a really BIG shoo" and concerned they don't want to peak too early....since things are definitely different this year, we asked some Albertan choirs what their COVID realities have been and here are some of their stories...

Resounding Joy – directed by Camille Ream, Fort Saskatchewan

We are blessed to have a large sanctuary so there is enough room for us to have a full choir and for ringers to social distance. We have been able to borrow an additional set of bells so we can ring full choir music at level 3 with no shared bells. Ringers are using tables or TV trays (if you remember what those are). Some tables have form and some are covered in blankets. We have been ringing "comfort music" - selections that have been our favourite over the years such as "Grazioso" by Sherman and "Joyously Ringing" by Stephenson as well as adding accompaniment to the hymns in the absence of singing. We are blessed to have Mary Manami, a wonderful pianist who can play anything that we need her to on the piano!

Ringers have donated additional funds to the church so that additional music stands, music, and binder stands could be purchased allowing each ringer to have their own supplies. We even needed to buy more clips to turn pages as each person has their own music! To decrease the handling of bell cases and congestion in the bell storage room, we have opted to have each ringer have a bag with towels or blankets to store their bells. Ringers then place their equipment in a "special place" in the church or take them home until the next rehearsal.

In the absence of singing in worship, we have opted to have a second handbell ensemble. This ensemble meets at the end of rehearsal and rings 12 bells music so that for now, bells are able to ring twice a month for worship.

Up until recently, worship has been both live and streamed at First United. We are now only live streaming the worship services. We always have one or two substitute ringers "on call" in case a ringer has COVID symptoms or has been exposed to someone with COVID.

We are currently preparing music for the Christmas eve services that will be prerecorded. It is a much different mindset to have to have all your Christmas Eve service music prepared by the end of November! After the recording for Christmas eve is done, rehearsal will be focused on Advent music. We must continue to be diligent in our efforts to ring safely. As a director (and retired nurse), I remind ringers every week how to stay safe and help keep others safe. This is an additional responsibility that is added to each director and ringer during this time.

Music is a wonderful part of our lives that helps us forget about all that is happening with COVID. **Resounding Joy** is truly blessed to be able to share time together and their music with others. Rev Paul writes "I have been blessed by the ministry of the ringers in worship. Their ministry adds that extra level which helps to make worship both joyful and peaceful. Please know that your ministry is valued by the church and that as you continue to seek ways to keep safe that we support you and the group."

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Resounding Joy - directed by Camille Ream, Fort Saskatchewan

We began rehearsals just after Thanksgiving with 11 of out 20 ringers. All ringers had to come into the building with masks and gloves and carrying their own bells wrapped in towels. We chose to have each ringer take their bells home each week. Each person also brought their own TV tray to hold their bells between songs. These tables were padded with towels that were used to transport the bells back and forth. There was no sharing of bells and one person had a full table with foam and all the accidentals. The music chosen was for Christmas and really focused on no bell sharing. There is quite a bit of music that is available that meets this qualification.

Because we are lucky enough to own 2 full sets of bells and one set of chimes, one ringer was able to take a full set of bells home and learn to play a bell tree. Our good friend, John Hooper, arranged the piece "Spirit of Life "by Carolyn McDade from the Voices United Hymnal. I played the piano for my bell tree ringer. After that was recorded, they were passed onto another ringer to learn a bell tree piece for Christmas.

Unfortunately, just before recording, our bells were no longer able to play because of new COVID restrictions. Hopefully we can resume after Christmas and learn some new music with no bell changes to share online for the church services.





Robertson-Wesley Ringers & Nova Bells – directed by Isabela Ramos, Edmonton

Director Isabela is taking the lemons that COVID has thrown her way by taking advantage of the opportunity for some online musical education and theory review. In her high-tech lingo, Isabela says of her **Nova Bells**, "Most of them are able to read music but are restricted to their clef. We will focus on identifying notes, major and minor chords, key signatures and all that **fun stuff**."

As for *RWR*, she is hoping to centre around more team building activities. "There isn't usually much time to do activities that promote teamwork and community building because we are all so focused on learning the <u>music</u> so I am looking at this as an opportunity to stay connected to music via the community." Sounds like excellent innovative ways to make the best of COVID times!

ALISON WOOD, 2008

Alison Elizabeth Wood is presented with an HONOURARY LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD from the newly incorporated Handbell Musicians of Canada.

Alison Elizabeth Wood was a founding member of the Alberta Guild of English Handbell Ringers (ALGEHR) in 1983 and later became its President. Having played and directed handbells for many years, she and a few other forward-thinking Canadian handbell musicians realised that there needed to be a coordinated provincial presence in order for Canada to be recognized in the international handbell world and at the International Handbell Committee (IHC) table. A Tri-Guild meeting of the Alberta, Ontario and Saskatchewan Guilds of English Handbell Ringers (ALGEHR, SGEHR, and OGEHR respectively) was held in Edmonton in 1991 bringing together the provincial guilds into a collective, working together cooperatively on special projects. Alison hosted this meeting in her home.

On September 25, 1994 the provincial guilds, now including the British Columbia Guild of English Handbell Ringers (BCGEHR), formally adopted the name Handbell Guilds of Canada (HGC). HGC continued in this fashion until September 2001 when a National Executive and Board of Directors was officially formed with representation from all provincial guilds, by then including the Manitoba Guild of English Handbell Ringers (MBGEHR). Alison was a driving force behind the formal establishment of the national handbell guild linking the provincial guilds across Canada and providing an avenue for communication and sharing. Alison became the inaugural Chair of HGC and held that position until August 2004.

As ALGEHR President, Alison was invited to chair the IHC meeting during Canada's first-ever and very successful hosting of the International Handbell Symposium (IHS) in Edmonton in August 1992. Alison was elected the official representative and voting member representing the Canadian guilds at the 1994 IHS held in Adelaide, South Australia. As Chair of HGC, Alison began serving on the International Handbell Committee (IHC) and was involved for 18 years. In 2004 she was elected the IHC Executive Director, a role she held for four years.

Alison is recognized as a handbell leader not only in Alberta but across Canada and internationally. As well as providing organizational and musical leadership provincially and nationally, Alison represented Canada as a conductor and clinician at various handbell festivals within the international handbell community, including Great Britain and USA. When the IHS was hosted in Vancouver, BC in 2016, Alison was presented with the International Handbell Committee's International Handbell Laureate award in recognition of her leadership and guidance of handbell ringing around the world. That same year Dr. John Hooper wrote a handbell composition entitled "Circles and Smiles," a work commissioned by ALGEHR in honour of Alison.

Alison has shared her great passion for music-making and building community through handbell ringing in Alberta, Canada and internationally. The Board of Directors of the newly re-organized Handbell Musicians of Canada and the HMC Interim Board of Directors are honoured to recognize Alison Wood's achievements with the first HMC Honourary Lifetime Achievement Award.
