I would not have thought a year ago that we would still have restrictions on handbell ringing at this juncture. However, there are some good things happening with **ALGEHR**. Our annual awards have recently been announced. Congratulations to **Catherine Bevan**, winner of the *Fred Merrett Award for New Compositions* in two categories. Catherine received the award for two compositions, *Voyageur's Dance Suite* (Category C) and *Rachmaninoff for Bells- Vocalise Op. 34*. (Category D). Congratulations to *JuBELLation*, Three Hills Arts Academy Handbell Choir, which received funding from the *Symposium Endowment Fund (SEF)* to purchase a Schulmerich F3 bell as an addition for their four-octave handbell set. *JuBELLation* is one of the few handbell choirs that has been able to meet in person to practice and perform over the past few months.

ALGEHR's first webinar series, **ALGEHR Rhythms**, has ended and **Sharon Vogrinetz** has sent out a short survey to all members and attendees for feedback and suggestions for future webinars. I think we had a good mix of topics and I've included a summary of the webinars in this issue. We plan to initiate a second series in September and would like to get your input.

Discovery 2021, Season of Ringing – Virtually Together, will take place on 15-16th October 2021. Fiona Miller and her organizing committee are putting together a lively program on a virtual platform. In addition to workshop sessions, there will be a concert of pre-recorded music submitted by handbell choirs. Our Annual General Meeting will also take place during **Discovery 2021.**

Ongoing work for the Board includes a website renovation with the never-ending and valuable help of **Cliff Linton** and **Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin** and continuing discussions on whether **ALGEHR** could be a conduit for Alberta composers to make their music available to handbell choirs, a much more complex issue than I had anticipated.

Finally, if you are thinking of making a donation to **ALGEHR**, there is an additional benefit to making it during June when *CanadaHelps* features the *Great Canadian Giving Challenge*. ALGEHR Rhythms: Season 1

Preamble

It was at the November 2020 Board meeting that we first discussed an **ALGEHR** webinar series as a means of maintaining interest in handbell ringing while not ringing during the pandemic. Everyone was Zooming – so why not us?

After a round of brainstorming, the idea gelled into something we thought we could handle – a monthly webinar from December to May providing a combination of Entertainment, Enlightenment and Education in the realm of handbells. I must be frank and admit that the Board was (and still is) concerned about decreasing Membership and thought that webinars would be an opportunity to showcase **ALGEHR**, encourage ringers to renew their annual subscriptions, and non-members to join **ALGEHR**. During that meeting, I was sitting in my favourite place at home (the sunroom) and my other half, Steve, was in his favourite place (the kitchen) and overhearing suggestions for names, yelled out, 'you can call it ALGEHR Rhythms!' And so we did.

The 'tech team' consisted of myself, **Tammy-Jo Mortensen**, **Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin and Sharon Vogrinetz**. We purchased a Zoom account, developed protocols for how to run a webinar, provided some basic information for Zoomers, and worked on a means to make registration and secure payment transaction easy. That done, we were ready to think about the remaining questions – when, what, and how much.

<u>When:</u> a fixed time and day each month? No, we chose a flexible option because of presenter availability and choosing a fixed day would mean some people could never attend. <u>What:</u> broadly there was one Entertainment webinar, one Enlightenment webinar and four Education webinars. But really, each webinar was a mix of the 3 E's. <u>How much:</u> the first two webinars were free to all attendees, the remaining four were free to ALGEHR members and \$10 for non-members.

The Webinars

Entertainment: Just before Christmas, Isabela Ramos entertained us with 'A Christmas Ding-Aling-Along, Wishing you Could Ring-Aling-Along', her choice of handbell music for Christmas. Some lovely pieces were selected, and Isabela's lively and amusing presentation was a joy when we were preparing for a somewhat muted Christmas season.

Enlightenment: In February, **Dr. Andrea McCrady** presented 'Like Angels' Harps Sounding Forth – A Day in the Life of the Peace Tower's Carillonneur'. This was a compelling talk about carillons in general and the Peace Tower Carillon in particular, including everything from its history to maintenance of the bells. The session ended with a selection of music written or adapted for the carillon. It was fascinating to hear how Dr. McCrady moved from her career in family medicine to her role as Dominion Carillonneur. And did you know that the only manual carillon in Alberta is in St. George In-the-Pines Anglican Church in Banff?

Education: the education webinars focused on new ringers and conductors. **Tammy-Jo Mortensen** and **Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin** each presented a webinar for beginner ringers: 'Handbells 101 – (Almost) Everything You Wanted to Know About Handbells But Were Afraid to Ask', Part 1 (January) and Part 2 (March).

Both webinars covered basic ringing techniques, using *Exploring Handbells Books 1 and 2* by **Betty B. Radford**, a well-respected handbell educator, composer and **ALGEHR** member. Becoming bolder with Zoom technology, we included videos of handbell ensembles playing music included in *Exploring Handbells - Bell Époque* (director Annie Hergott) playing *Huron Carol*, and Alberta Youth ensembles playing *Floating* (*Borealis Rings*) and *Three Acrobats* (*Ringing Explosion*). Several teachers attended both sessions and there was a lively side discussion on how to keep school handbell choirs ringing safely during the pandemic.

Our third educational webinar (April), 'Conducting for Beginners', was presented by Ellie Hodder, a well-known handbell teacher and clinician, ALGEHR member, and honourary Canadian from Portland, Oregon. Starting with an outstanding and instructive video presentation on conducting techniques, she moved on to demonstrate directing of For the Beauty of the Earth (arranged by Larry Sue) with scores distributed to all participants to follow along.

Finally in May, we moved to *Plink! Plank! Plunk!*, a workshop on malleting presented by **Damien Lim**, Director of *Ministry of Bellz (MOB)*, from Singapore. This was an innovative live (and lively) presentation and with two cameras and microphones set up in Damien's studio, the techniques, for example how to hold the mallets, where on the casting to strike, were clearly demonstrated.

So what next? We are planning a second webinar series starting in September and already have some ideas for presenters. You will have received an online survey giving you an opportunity to suggest topics for webinars and if you would consider presenting a webinar, having gained a fair bit of technical know-how over the last six months, we can help you make it happen! JuBELLation Performance ~ March 21, 2021



JU*BELL*ATION (Three Hills) was again privileged to present a program of handbell music on March 21 at Prairie Tabernacle in anticipation of the Easter season. The choir provided approximately 20 minutes of prelude music, to which the congregation had been invited to come a bit earlier to hear. The selections included two brilliant arrangements, communicating joy and praise. They are entitled, *Hallelujah* and *Jubilant Ring*. Between these notes of exultation was a more meditative medley of *Spirituals*. In designing the arrangement, our director, **Vi Berg**, opened the medley with *Swing Low, Sweet Chariot* in the key of F followed by a transition to the key of Ab. In the first verse of *There Is a Balm in Gilead* the mallets played the bass bells, most of which were in thirds and sixths, against the melody line played by the treble bells. The second verse moved the melody to the lower register and in the high register of the bells, the mallets played colorful harmonic textures. The final piece in the medley, *All Through the Night*, was played on melody chimes in verse 1. Verse 2 was played on the bells with several spots of trills on Bb6 and C7.

The remaining two selections, *Deep River* and *Thine Be the Glory* were arrangements I brought home from the **2016 Vancouver Symposium**. We are blessed to have a capable mother and daughter team to play the oboe and cello for *Deep River*. What a beautiful arrangement it is! *Thine Be the Glory* was a triumphant rendition of such majestic music. The congregation responded with enthusiastic applause and the pastor warmly welcomed the choir back any time.

We were saddened that our May 16 final performance was closed down due to the COVID situation. However, it is understandable and we live in hope that our program can be performed in the Fall.
