ALGEHR is pleased to report that the acquisition of the CUE (Concordia University of Edmonton) Collection (renamed the Albert Guild Collection or AGC) has a very successful community outreach pilot project!

Wendy Hoskin and Sharon Vogrinetz have been running a six-week introduction to bells program for people at St Timothy's Anglican and community. "We have eleven enthusiastic individuals who are learning the basics of ringing, various techniques used with bells and chimes and how to work as a team. The group has come along so quickly they have decided to prepare a piece to play at Rev Clare Stewart's induction. We have had a lot of fun and it has been a privilege to work with such a great group of enthusiastic people."

Carol Chernishenko has been involved with handbell ringing for over 30 years as a ringer and conductor. Carol's first experience with handbells was a Christmas concert where her friend was ringing. At times, it was pretty music and other times it was magical!

It was several months before Carol could join the *Regina Bell Ringers (RBR)*, a community choir. With RBR, Carol started as choir member (C6D6 were hers!), then started solo ringing and finally small ensemble ringing when a few others wanted to try something new. For many years, Carol was the Secretary for the *Saskatchewan Guild of English Handbell Ringers* along with President **Carol Petrie**. After a slight break, Carol became the director at Wesley United Church in Regina. Judging by the number of tunnels in the flower bed I rather suspect that my bulbs have been keeping an army of mouse stomachs full this winter. People in our neighbourhood are already asking when my gnomes are coming back from their winter vacation. Believe it or not, gnome gardens are a time-consuming and expensive undertaking. Every year you have to keep up the interest by adding something new. This year, thanks to Board member **Carol Chernishenko**'s talented husband, **Bernie**, I have acquired two owls (Wallace and Waffles) and a tractor. Bernie also contributed other items to the silent auction part of **Spring Ring and Bling**.

Spring Ring and Bling 2022 was a great success and raised over \$5,000 towards our purchase of the Alberta Guild Handbell Collection (AGC), formerly known as the CUE collection. We have now raised more than half the funds required for our final payment instalment, due March 2023. Past President and Peal Editor, *Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin*, spent hours working on both the silent auction and the concert – I have no idea how we could have managed without her fundraising expertise and her zeal in planning and making the evening a success. Thanks to everyone who donated items for the auction – there really was something for everyone. Finding suitable items is not easy so thanks for your ingenuity in digging in the attic, finding people to offer service items (my aged piano will receive some tuning therapy) and nudging friends, family and neighbours to do likewise. Many thanks to Treasurer, **Sharon Vogrinetz**, for her mastery of all things financial relating to silent auctions, to VP North, **Tammy-Jo Mortensen**, for her ability to provide thoughtful answers to any questions I throw in her direction, and to our MCs, the Lethbridge dancing and ringing duo, **Fiona and David Miller**. A further thank you for everyone's ingenuity in getting items from their original locations to their new homes.

The acquisition of the AGC has taken up a lot of time for the Board. Since the last edition of **The Peal**, we have finalized the purchase agreement, signed an agreement for storage and rehearsal time at St Timothy's Anglican Church in southwest Edmonton, purchased an insurance policy, moved the bells to their new location, instituted a weekly program for novice ringers, established a rental subcommittee, and discussed terms for rental agreements for any handbell group in Alberta wishing to loan bells from the collection.

An item discussed at our last Board meeting was **ALGEHR**'s membership categories and whether we should move away from the current three categories – Regular, Ringer and Life Membership – to a new structure- Regular, Youth/Senior and Life Membership. The cost of Youth/Senior membership would be the same as a current Ringer membership. Under the new structure, all **ALGEHR** members would receive the same benefits of membership – currently, Ringer members, almost half of **ALGEHR**'s members, are not able to vote nor become Members of the Board. There will be further discussion at the AGM in October. If approved, there will need to be a Bylaw change before implementation, likely September 2023.

Congratulations to **Karen Abrahamson** from Edmonton on receiving the **Stan Morris Award for Excellence in Handbell Teaching**. Largely because of the pandemic we have received no application for the past two years so it especially gratifying to receive a nomination this year.

Our webinar season came to an end on 14th May with **Camille Ream** and **Susan Galloway** providing a review of repertoire for the next season of ringing. This year's webinars focused on more advanced topics – teaching handbells, solo ringing and composing handbell music. We are planning already for another season of webinars and would appreciate suggestions for topics for members.

Don't forget **Discovery 2022**! **Lorna Walker** and her organizing committee are planning an enticing program for Adult and Youth ringers at St. Albert United Church on 14th and 15th October. Watch the website (<u>www.algehr.org</u>) for more details.

Remembering Dorothy Kelker

On May 4, 2022, our **ALGEHR** handbell family lost a dedicated ringer, talented composer and committed supporter of our organization. We also lost a dear friend, a gentle soul and the most positive spirit that could not be defeated even in the face of life's most extreme challenges. While her multi-year journey with cancer came to a quiet end, those who knew her were fortunate to have witnessed her joy and passion for outdoor life and nature and perhaps have even learned more about them through her infectious enthusiasm.

During her final weeks, she did not back down from the call to donate and contribute to our virtual silent auction and concert, *Spring Ring & Bling*. Her original composition, "Tango", was the object of a hot bidding war. In true Dorothy form, she offered the prize to the two top bidders and effectively doubled the value of her precious gift to **ALGEHR**. One of the Guild's early donors from our *GivingTuesday* campaign, despite being very ill, she participated in a donor interview during the silent auction. When I asked her a few years ago about how her award-winning composition "Wild and Precious Life" came to be, she quoted these lines from **Mary Oliver**'s famous poem "The Summer Day":

I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel in the grass, how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields which is what I have been doing all day. Tell me, what else should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon? Tell me, what is it you plan to do With your one wild and precious life?

This Level 4 original composition was the 2020 Winner of the **Fred Merrett Award for New Compositions, Category C**. Dorothy will be deeply missed by all of us, but her legacy lives on in her music. To me, "The Summer Day" is how I will always remember her.

News from Northern Alberta Ensembles

At Camrose United, our bell choir managed to ring a little over the past two years, including a few weeks outdoors in front of the church during the past two summers, working mostly with music that required no sharing of bells. We bought a couple of extra tables and foams so we could spread out a bit more when we moved inside in the fall of 2020, but that only lasted a few weeks. Last fall we were mostly back to normal (we were masked and will continue to be for the foreseeable future), and even managed a couple of mini-concerts of Christmas music, including outdoors in the snow in late November, as part of the Downtown Camrose tree lighting and Midnight Madness event. We were definitely thankful it wasn't too cold that day! We started up again this past March, rang for 9 or 10 weeks, and wrapped up our season by playing in the service on May 8. For nearly half of our rehearsals, we had at least 1 person missing because of just having been in close contact with someone who had Covid. That, along with some people away for various other reasons means we had our first rehearsal with everyone a week before our last service!

Who Loves ALGEHR?

Our recent online fundraiser, *Spring Ring & Bling*, was a resounding success, again, thanks to the overwhelming support of our **ALGEHR** members, friends and donors. We more than surpassed our silent auction sales goal and then some! With an additional \$5349.20 in online donations, the event raised a grant total of \$10,624.17. This brings the **Alberta Guild Collection** fundraising campaign to over \$31,400! Here are some thoughts from our next featured donor, **Moira Day**, about how **ALGEHR** has become an important part of her family's reality. Moira is a ringer, the mother of a ringer and an **ALGEHR** donor – although not necessarily in that order.

The entire family has been active in music over the years through various choirs and musical instruments. Our youngest of our 3 daughters, **Linnet** got her start in bells through a youth summer music camp at Concordia University of Edmonton. She continued to ring with **JuBellation** during her BA studies at CUE. Since my husband and I are retired, we joined Linnet and started to ring as well.

We decided to support **ALGEHR**'s fundraising efforts because the arts are a very good way for young people with developmental delays or cognitive/communication disorders to become involved as full members of the music and arts community. We have seen what playing in a handbell ensemble can do to teach students of all skills and levels the joy of making music together. If CUE had decided not to make that part of their educational and community mission by closing their School of Music, it seemed important that someone else should pick up the torch.

Playing bells is in some ways very similar to singing in a choir. You are part of a community working and creating together to make something larger than any one of the individuals involved – and then sharing that gift of music with a larger community yet again. It's just so important to do that as a way to break the solitude imposed by COVID. We're looking forward to the chance to play with friends and family again and possibly to share our music not just with Edmonton, but other communities and musicians. Although this year's tour of Slovakia and Poland was cancelled because of the war in Ukraine, we hope that travel will be possible again in 2023.


