Depending how the Coronavirus behaves, we will plan for an in-person event but hopefully will make some workshop sessions available on a virtual platform. It certainly expanded the number of attendees at *Discovery 2021*.

We extend our condolences to **Cliff Linton**, Life Member of **ALGEHR** and former Board member on the loss of his wife, **Linda**, in early December. Like Cliff, Linda was an avid ringer and especially loved to volunteer and direct bells at her grandchildren's school in Calgary.

Life with **ALGEHR** seems to be busy at the moment, the most pressing challenge being the purchase of the **Concordia University of Edmonton (CUE)** handbell collection to expand our education outreach to adults, youth and seniors. We are planning a summer camp this year and a Spring Break camp in 2023 which should provide a fun experience for young ringers, while helping balance our budget. **ALGEHR** has a new committee: the Fundraising Committee, chaired by **Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin** and comprising both Board members and external invitees. Kudos to Emmy for initiating the *GivingTuesday* fundraising event on 30th November which featured handbell music from across the province, including both youth and adult ensembles. Thanks to **Tammy-Jo Mortensen**, the MC with an assortment of bad handbell jokes, and **Sharon Vogrinetz** who, as usual, was the tech guru with the golden touch. And of course, thanks to all the ringers who contributed their talents. We have raised over \$19,000 to date which is quite outstanding. Many thanks to all our donors. Watch for Emmy's announcement of **Spring Ring & Bling** as the next fundraising initiative on April 23rd. I am not going to steal her thunder so will say nothing more here – read about it in this edition of **The Peal**.

We suspended our monthly webinar session in October because of **Discovery 2021** and in November because of **GivingTuesday**. I guess you can hardly call the Christmas party (Fa-La x9) an educational webinar, but it was certainly quite popular. We continued the webinars in January and many thanks to Emmy for her seminar on advanced solo and ensemble ringing.

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I admit I really tried hard to ring four-in-hand, but alas, I failed. My excuse is that, like skiing, I took up handbells too late in life to ever become proficient. As for skiing, I was terrified both getting on and off the quad and hurtling down whatever slope confronted me.

On February 26th we had a webinar presented by British composer, **Benjamin Till**. He was commissioned to compose music that involved ringing a tower bell in every London church named in the children's nursery rhyme, "Oranges and Lemons", regardless of the state of decay of the church and its bells. On April 2nd **Betty Radford**, one of our new Board members, will lead a webinar on composing music for handbells. Watch for more details.

Who Loves ALGEHR?

As you might recall, *GivingTuesday* was ALGEHR's kick-off to its major fundraising campaign to purchase the CUE (Concordia University of Edmonton) Handbell Collection. It was a great evening of wonderful performances from around the province and stories from some of the folks who hold ALGEHR near and dear to their heart. Our initial fundraising efforts resulted in over \$7000 in just 2 hours! At the time of writing, our current total is an impressive \$19,501.20 and we are well on our way to reach our objective of \$50,000. This would not have been possible without the generosity of our amazing donors. THANK YOU!!!

In this edition of *The Peal*, Fred and Amy Merrett share why they love ALGEHR and are supporting this campaign. For those who may not know Fred personally, this is a great summary of his love story with handbells.

It was a pleasure for us to donate to the Concordia purchase. Anything that keeps the bells ringing is so satisfying. The legacy is much appreciated.

Fred is definitely a pioneer, having formed the first high school band in Manitoba in 1951. John Nelson from Schulmerich first introduced Fred to handbells. Fred then started a bell group at the Technical Vocational High School in Winnipeg in 1964. He was happy to bring handbells into the school program when he moved to Edmonton in 1973 and was on staff at Harry Ainlay High School. Then he organized many conferences and workshops for teachers to learn all about handbell ringing. He loved to see it grow. He also taught at the International Music Camp located on the border between Manitoba and North Dakota every summer and would be happy to drive anyone who wanted to attend. That program is still very popular.

Fred and I loved to play handbell duets—performing at senior residences, church services, etc. and especially at our casual 'at-home' concerts when we could entertain up to twenty-five people at a time. Fred would ring six-in-hand plus many pick-ups, while I almost managed two or three (ha ha). He wrote all the music specifically for us. The week between Christmas and New Year's Day was devoted to a concert every evening. We actually called ourselves "The Ding-a-Ling Duo."

Fred's final count for published handbell music is 148 numbers, including several 'how to' manuals.

When we moved to our long-term care facility, the space in our suite would not accommodate the area that is needed to set up the bells. We miss ringing very much. We keep up with music in our lives when we play instrumental duets (trumpet and clarinet) every day. Fred has arranged 135 of our favourite tunes with piano accompaniments, and although the sound is definitely not as beautiful as handbells, it is good for our lungs—and fun.




ALGEHR Rhythms: Weaving in Three Hills

Several of us in JU**BELL**ATION were able to attend Emmy's webinar on January 29. How much we appreciated and benefitted from her instruction in several areas of bell ringing! What should our next step be but to go to work drilling the techniques Emmy's presented! And that we did, starting the very next Wednesday, February 3. Over the last three weeks we have had excellent workouts on the "weaving" technique. Our coordination skills have been challenged, we have coached one another, and we have enjoyed lots of fun and laughter along the way!

For the second part of our practice we worked on a quartet arrangement of "What Wondrous Love". Again, following Emmy's advice, we first sat down with copies of the arrangement, pencil and eraser in hand, studying the score in detail and each ringer making the necessary markings for playing their particular bells. Then, when we then went to play the arrangement in ensemble, it was a delight to see how well we all played our part for the first time. Certainly we need much more practice on playing the arrangement, but what a positive start! The ensemble picture was taken last Wednesday, February 16, when we had acquired a new ringer!

Another bell ringing event was on Boxing Day Sunday, December 26, 2021! Due to Covid, our choir had been unable to practice last Fall. However, not to be completely deterred, I (**Rhoda**) took the opportunity to prepare playing a Bell Tree solo of a lovely arrangement of "We Three Kings". **Glenn Flewelling**, another choir member, played the creative and delightful accompaniment with his wife, **Marsha**, turning the pages. The Sunday morning congregation was very appreciative of the presentation!

A Crafty ALGEHR Christmas





ALGEHR Rhythms: Oranges and Lemons...and Bells?

As mentioned previously, the most recent webinar of our series took place on Saturday, February 26, 2022 with a special guest from London, England.

Benjamin Till is a multi-award-winning, BAFTA (British Academy of Film and Television Arts) nominated filmmaker and composer who is a pioneer in the unusual genre of the televised documentary musical in which ordinary people sing about their own lives. He is the Resident Composer and a vocalist for Mosaic Voices, a professional male-voice choir based at New West End Synagogue in Central London. As a composer, he's known for writing hugelyambitious, often site-specific or place-inspired works.

In 2009, Benjamin recorded all the bells mentioned in the nursery rhyme, "Oranges and Lemons" (two hundred bells in seventeen London churches), and wrote a piece of music to feature them all playing in harmony, alongside a choir of people who live or work in one of the areas around the churches. This twelve-minute composition, which included a staggering 4000 individual bell strikes was featured on BBC Radio 3's *In Tune* and <u>BBC Radio 4's *Today*</u> *Programme*,^[2] alongside in depth coverage by <u>BBC London</u>,^{[3][4][5]} who sponsored the piece with <u>Arts Council England</u>. The piece received its premiere performance on 11 July 2009 at <u>St.</u> <u>Mary le Bow</u> Church, London. If you missed the webinar, you can view it <u>here</u>, but without the fascinating behind-the-scenes and how-it-came-to-be story that Benjamin presented, it might not be nearly as impressive as it was for the attendees.

Here are some thoughts from ALGEHR Membership Secretary, Lucy Graham:

I was unfamiliar with the lyrics - not in our Canadian books and I don't remember my Mom ever reading it to us. Nor did we ever learn the tune. Guess it is an English tune. It was interesting to learn the meaning of the words or places mentioned in the lyrics - oranges and lemons being unloaded at the docks near the church of Saint Clements, Saint John's bell being in the Tower of London, the bells of Old Bailey - Bailey being the jail, and then St. Sepulchre's bell tolling in the morning when the inmates were condemned to die. Also interesting to hear that the **WhiteChapel** bell factory is now closed. Groups with **WhiteChapel** bells have a treasure. The "bell used chart" indicating which notes the bells at the different churches rang. Who knew every church bell tower had different notes! Amazing how Benjamin was able to incorporate all the church bells into his composition. Thanks again to the **ALGEHR Rhythms** committee for putting on this webinar/workshop.
