# **Presidential Pandemic Ponderings**

Dammit! Sixty thousand honeybees in the backyard and I've just been stung by a bumble bee in the flower bed. The joys of being a novice beekeeper. My sister and brother-in-law have kept bees for years – I blame them for my interest. My sister worked as a hospital accountant and was given the task of blending two positions into one and then making herself redundant. My brother-in-law was a graduate student in English Literature, studying the novels of Samuel Becket when I first met him. To cut a long story short, the hive accepted the new queen graciously and hopefully we will have lots of baby bees, more honey and I will have a happy spouse.

Please plan also to attend our Annual General Meeting at 3.15 pm on 16<sup>th</sup> October at the conclusion of the workshop sessions. Thanks to **Cliff Linton** and **Emmy Okazawa-Bortolin** who are working on a developing a new **ALGEHR** website which we hope to showcase at the AGM. And remember that we will also be looking for new **ALGEHR** Board members. The Board is a small group of handbell ringers, and we welcome anyone with enthusiasm, new ideas and new perspectives to join us. We will make sure that you have a mentor to ease you into position. We will also be starting our second **ALGEHR** webinar series, **ALGEHR Rhythms**. # Handbell Music Review

With such uncertainty about ringing, we want to offer a few new options for ringing this fall. "Hope", "Alleluias!" and "Grace" are all for written for small ensembles with piano. There are no shared bells! These three original pieces are written by Canadian composer **Erwin Stroobach**.

This music is different from many small ensemble music not only because it is original and more challenging but also because the music is like a duet between the ringers and the piano. Many ensemble pieces are arrangements of sacred hymn tunes at about a level 2 and often without piano accompaniment.

At **First United Church in Fort Saskatchewan**, we have a small ensemble (5 ringers) who have enjoyed the challenge of this music – especially the interactions between the ringers and the piano. We are looking forward to sharing this music in a live worship service! Erwin's ensemble from his home church, **Cambridge Street United in Ontario**, performed these pieces in a recorded concert with 4 ringers and Erwin on the piano.

### Hope ~ F5 to C7 and piano

We all need hope right now so this is the perfect time for this original composition. It is great to have original quartet music at a level 3 and be written by a Canadian composer with an amazing piano part. The recurring theme is filled with hope and excitement and is contrasted by the ethereal sounds of the piano and LVs in the bells. This is one of those pieces that plays by itself musically with beautiful dynamics and ritards – filled with hope, passion and caring.

### Alleluias! ~ 3 or 4/5 octaves and piano

This original composition is truly full of alleluias and rejoicing! At first glance, it appears to be just another 12-bell piece of music, but on further examination, it is filled with much much more! It feels more like a bell and piano duet than bell music with a piano accompaniment.

The music starts out with high energy shakes and marts! Although the music is written in 4/4, there are sections that feel more like 8/8. In the middle section, all ringers switch from their treble bells to bass bells. Bass bells use the singing bell technique while the piano is featured with a beautiful melodic section. The bells and piano then move to a rhythmic section. The piece ends like it began, full of energy and rejoicing.

#### Grace ~ F5 to C7 and piano

This original handbell music can be rung with 4, 5 or 6 ringers. The piece is in 6/8 time – different from his other compositions. The first time Susan listened to the music, she loved it! She was inspired and can hardly wait to share it in worship. The lilt helps the music flow and fills it with grace. This music fits any occasion, whether it is a sacred or secular setting. *Handbells etc* is thrilled the Erwin has composed this piece for a small handbell ensemble to ring during these stressful times.
